## Network's help in looking for Kilmarnock's finest

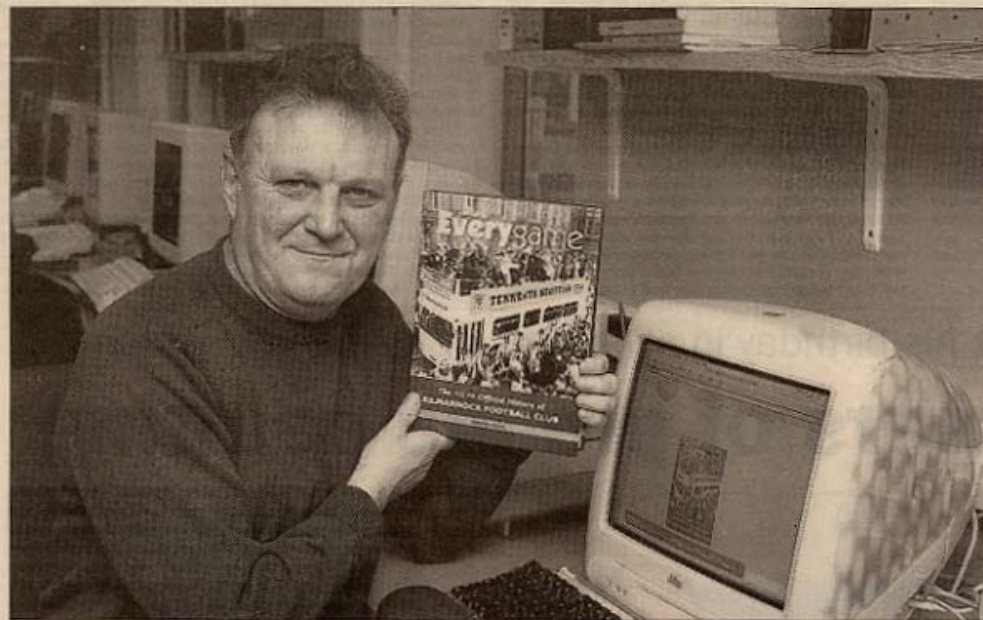
**A** PENZANCE based author has just seen his latest book published - 'Everygame: The Official History of Kilmarnock Football Club' - and says it is largely thanks to the Digital Peninsula Network.

David Ross told Weekender People that DPN's facilities allowed him to remain based in Penzance while he compiled the book - an exhaustive account of the Scottish club's 130 year history - instead of relocating to his native Scotland.

"It's a very data rich book, but DPN's broadband connection allowed me to do most of the work from down here.

"I still had to go to Scotland to do research and for the launch, but actually writing the book could be done down here - over 500 miles from where it would be published.

"I remember in the past you had to photo-copy each page and hand deliver it to the publisher - now, thanks to DPN and its broadband connection, that is a thing of the past," added David, who is currently having to take some time off work due to ill health.
